

harvest expected by the end of 2013.

"It's taken us about six years to get to this point," said founder and CEO Cliff Morris. "For five-and-a-half years, I've been running on adrenaline. Now, I'm running on excitement."

Morris said he never heard of Fellsmere before Helene Caseltine from the Indian River County Chamber of Commerce suggested he visit with Fellsmere City Manager Jason Nunemaker.

"I accomplished more with Jason in two weeks that I did in two years in Palm Beach County," said Morris. "I can't praise the City of Fellsmere enough. We want to be the spark that kindles a fire in Fellsmere and the entire region."

Nunemaker said the aquaculture project is the third of three projects that have recently been unveiled in his small, rural community. He cited the new National Elephant Center and the Army-funded ROTC challenge course as two other ways Fellsmere is encouraging economic development within the community.

"It is a perfect fit," said Nunemaker. "And I love the idea of foreign investment. You have folks coming from all over the world and investing in the United States and Fellsmere in particular. It gives us a shot in the arm."

U.S. Sen. Bill Nelson was scheduled to deliver the keynote address for the groundbreaking but was called away on a family emergency. Replacing Nelson was former Florida State Sen. Ken Pruitt, who joked that perhaps the shrimp could be an offering that Nelson, who is a Democrat, takes to Washington to make peace with Republicans.

"It is a buzz that Florida Aquaculture has been created here in Fellsmere," said Pruitt. "We are very happy you chose the City of Fellsmere for this incredibly important venture."


Indian River County Chamber President Penny Chandler said the aquaculture project is a great example of the success that can be achieved when business and government collaborate.




Mayor Susan Adams, who runs Marsh Landing Restaurant in Fellsmere, said she tasted samples of the shrimp during a test harvest.
